

- Religion









Dr. David Livingstone


- Doctor, explorer, missionary, scientist, reformer
- Wanted to find source of Nile River and disappeared in the 1860s
- Reporter Henry Stanley hired to find him
- Found in 1871 in southeastern Africa
- 1879, Stanley returned, representing Belgium
- By 1880s, European nations started coming in





The Scramble for Africa

 - Created many issues that still exist today


