




Reflect on the Risk activity last class and answer the following questions with explanations.







The "Powder Keg" of Europe

Balkan Peninsula

- Formerly part of the Ottoman Empire for around 500 years
- Largely populated by Slavic people
- New countries formed between late 1800s and early 1990s, took advantage of a weak Ottoman Empire
- Each wanted to expand their territories
- Very nationalistic, especially Serbia
- Ethnic nationalism → Balkan League with Russian help

Balkan Wars (1912 – 1913)

- 1st war: Balkan League vs Ottoman Empire
- 2nd war: Formers allies against each other (Bulgaria)




Ottoman Empire (1299 – 1923)

Pan-Slavism

An idea that all Slavic people would unite under one country

Serbia

- Very nationalistic
- Wanted to create a pan-Slavic country
- Wanted a seaport in the Adriatic Sea

Russia

- Largest Slavic population
- Felt obligated to protect other Slavs
- Political interests
- Only ally in the Balkans: Serbia

Assassination of the Archduke of Austria

On June 28, 1914, Archduke Franz Ferdinand, heir to the throne of Austria-Hungary and his wife were shot dead in public in Sarajevo by Serbian nationalist, Gavrilo Princip.

 Part of a Serbian secret society called the Black Hand

Despite disliking Slavs, Ferdinand was interested in treating Slavs better and offering them more rights

 Did not want a war with Russia

His death was highly ironic.

Austro-Hungarian Response

Kaiser Wilhelm II offered unconditional support to Austria-Hungary and urged them to be aggressive.

Austria-Hungary issued an ultimatum (final demand) with a list of 10 demands to Serbia on July 23, 1914.

- Deliberately harsh
 - End anti-Austrian activity
 - Remove government officials at Austria-Hungary's demands
 - Accept Austro-Hungarian representatives to suppress movements

Serbia accepted 9 of the 10 and partially for the last



War declared on July 28th, 2014. World War I starts.



- France






Schlieffen Plan

A military plan Germany developed to invade France


- Modified a few times
- Original plan was to invade France
- Knock France out of the war early and then concentrate on Russia
 - Believed Russia would mobilize slower
- France heavily fortified border after Franco-Prussian War (1871)
- Belgium, north of France, weaker



LANDS INVOLVED IN THE WORLD WAR

More than seven eighths of the inhabited area of the world took part in the war, as indicated by the black shading.
