Political Parties



- A group seeking control of government through winning and holding offices
- Share similar/common ideas and/or principles
- Take on platforms
 - Positions/Stands parties take on policies

Coalition

 Union of different people or groups who come together



Do we need political parties?

"A party of order or stability, and a party of progress or reform, are both necessary elements of a healthy state of political life."

- John Stuart Mill, *On Liberty*, 1859

"It serves always to distract the public councils and enfeeble the public administration. It agitates the community with ill-founded jealousies and false alarms, kindles the animosity of one part against another, foments occasionally riot and insurrection. It opens the door to foreign influence and corruption, which finds a facilitated access to the government itself through the channels of party passions. Thus the policy and the will of one country are subjected to the policy and will of another."

- George Washington, *Farewell Address*, 1796




Some would argue that political parties are **essential** to democracy

- Serve as link between people & government
- Act as medium to provide choices/options to the people for government action
- A way for people's voice (will of the people) to be heard by the government

Major Parties

- Dominant political parties that hold substantial influence in a country
- Republican Party (GOP, Grand Old Party)
- Democratic Party





Minor Parties

- Parties without as much power and influence as major parties
- Usually not spread across the country

Two-Party System

 Party system where two major political parties dominate politics



- United States did not intend to be one
 - Federalist vs. Anti-Federalist
 - Federalist vs. Democratic-Republicans
 - Democrats vs. Republicans (today)



Fewer parties

flourish

Winner-Take-All rules

How the two-party system perpetuates itself

Strategic as viable

Only one winner (loser gets nothing)


voting and Voters choose not to support parties that they do not view

the "wasted vote' theory

Lack of voter support discourages formation of minor parties

Our Electoral System

- Discourages minor parties
- Election laws purposely written to discourage it
- Bipartisan way to preserve power
 - Two parties finding common ground on an issue





Multiparty System

- Many European countries
- Argues it gives more choices, representation, and responsiveness to the will of the people
- - Coalitions



One-Party System

- Usually dictatorships
- "No-party" system
- •Some U.S. states can be considered as such





One-Party System

- Can be argued that many states are oneparty systems*
- *One party regularly wins elections
